Greek Glossary

ACTIVE: An undergraduate who has completed all new member or intake requirements and has been initiated by their chapter.

ALUMNI: Greek members who are college graduates.

ALUMNA: An initiated fraternity and sorority member who is no longer active in his/her collegiate chapter.

BID: A formal invitation to join a sorority or fraternity.

CHAPTER: The name applied to the local organization of an international fraternity or sorority.

GAMMA CHI: A disaffiliated Panhellenic sorority member who serves as a recruitment counselor and acts as a guide or source of information for potential new members.

IFC: Interfraternity Council is the governing body of the five-member fraternity system. Affiliated with the North-American Interfraternity Conference which represents 75 international and national men's fraternities

INITIATION: The formal ceremony in which new members become full members of a sorority or fraternity.

LEGACY: A potential member who is the sibling, child, or grandchild of an active member or alumni of a Greek organization.

MEMBERSHIP INTAKE: The process through which NPHC sororities and fraternities select new members.

NEW MEMBER: A student who has accepted a bid or invitation for membership in a fraternity or sorority but has not been initiated.

NPC: National Panhellenic Conference, the conference body of the 26 women's sororities to support the collegiate and alumnae chapters of the NPC member groups. The college chapter is the governing body of the three-member sororities.

NPHC: National Pan-Hellenic Council, the national governing body for the nine historically African-American sororities and fraternities. The college chapter is the governing body of the four-member fraternities and sororities.

PHILANTHROPY: Service project/charity undertaken by a sorority or fraternity on a campus, community, or national level.

PIN/BADGE: The sorority or fraternity member's insignia of membership.

POTENTIAL NEW MEMBER: A student who is interested in becoming a member of a fraternity or sorority.

RECRUITMENT: A designated membership recruitment time period during which each fraternity and sorority governed by Panhellenic/IFC/NPHC holds a series of organized activities.

TOTAL: The most desirable chapter size for a campus, as determined by the college's National Panhellenic Conference.

QUOTA: The maximum number each NPC sorority may invite to join the organization.

Fraternity & Sorority members hold many other campus leadership positions too.

Service

At UAHuntsville, our fraternities and sororities consistently address the needs of the global, national, and local community by hosting philanthropic events. Each chapter dedicates itself to worthy local causes and national/international philanthropies by donating their time and fund-raising efforts to help others. This past year, our Fraternity & Sorority community donated thousands of volunteer hours providing services and funding for charitable organizations.

Scholarship

Above all other endeavors set out by UAHuntsville's fraternities and sororities, students earning their degrees and graduating is the most important. Historically, members of Greek-letter organizations have excelled scholastically and continue to today. Each organization requires over a 2.5 grade point average to join and most maintain specific grades to remain a member.

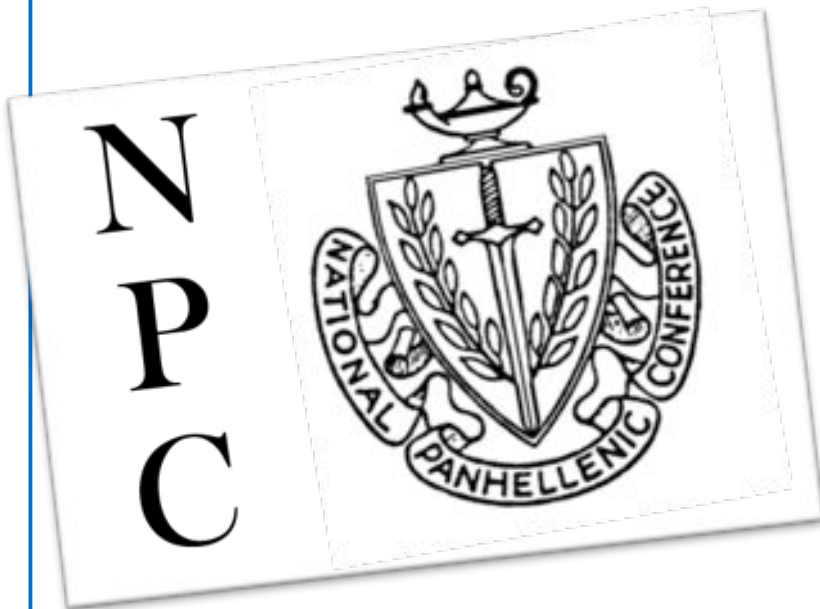

More Than Just Letters – Then NPHC Experience

Membership Intake

Please note that none of the NPHC organizations at UAHuntsville allow undergraduates to join until they have completed at least one semester of school and have proven themselves academically. Some organizations require that one full year of academics be completed before they can begin to discuss the membership intake process for their organization. The intake process begins in the spring semester for some organizations and occurs in the fall for others, but do not be surprised if you are a freshman and you are not invited to any informational meetings during your freshman year.

The actual intake process begins with an informational meeting. Most of these informational meetings are advertised for a short period of time and by word of mouth from members. At the informational meeting, interested students are invited to learn more about a specific organization and the specifics of the application process for that organization. You should note that at this point, hopeful aspirants (or members to be) are expected to have researched all of the NPHC fraternities and sororities and know a great deal about the organization they are visiting. It is not generally accepted behavior for a person to attend more than one organization's informational meeting. UAHuntsville provides a student organization showcase during Orientation as an opportunity to visit all the fraternities and the sororities as well as an event during the Week of Welcome.

After the informational meetings, generally, potential aspirants are asked to complete a membership application and show proof that they have achieved the organization's minimum standards for academics, community service, and leadership. Each organization is different in what they ask for and how they can be documented, but all require a minimum grade point average and an official transcript. The approval process for the applications varies from organization to organization, but all include alumni in the review and evaluation process.

After the applications have been approved, the membership education program begins. There are three important components in the membership intake process: (1) a pre-induction/orientation period, (2) the final induction ceremony, and (3) an in-depth education program. The final pledge of oath of allegiance taken by a candidate from whom he/she cannot withdraw it is a lifetime commitment. Each organization has its own ritual ceremony, but all basically have the objective that this rite is intended to be impressive. Each affiliate organization implements the guidelines and details of its own membership intake process, so the lengths of the specific programs vary.

The small group of women who organized the Sorority was conscious of a privileged position as college-trained women of color, just one generation removed from slavery. They were resolute that their college experiences should be as meaningful and productive as possible. Alpha Kappa Alpha was founded to apply that determination; however, its influence extends beyond campus quads and student interest. It has a legacy of service that deepens, rather than ends, with college graduation. This oldest Black Greek letter organization established for and by women of color is comprised of a nucleus of 450,000 members in graduate and undergraduate chapters in the United States, the U. S. Virgin Islands, the Caribbean, Canada, Japan, Germany, Korea and on the continent of Africa. Since its founding over a century ago, Alpha Kappa Alpha's mission has been to cultivate and encourage high scholastic and ethical standards, to promote unity and friendship among college women, to study and help alleviate problems concerning girls and women in order to improve their social stature, to maintain a progressive interest in college life, and to be of *"Service to All Mankind."*

Alpha Phi Alpha, the first intercollegiate Greek-lettered fraternity established for African-Americans, was founded on the campus of Cornell University in Ithaca, New York on December 4, 1906. Seven visionary founders, known as the "Jewels" of the Fraternity, recognized a need for a strong bond of Brotherhood between African descendants in this country. On August 7, 1990 the campus of the University of Alabama in Huntsville (UAH) became the seat for the 772nd chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity Inc. Today the chapter is both active and involved on campus and in the community. Indeed, we are alive and well, and continue the journey first embarked by the early trailblazers in their quest to become first of all, servants of all and to transcend all.

Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated was founded on January 13, 1913 by twenty-two courageous collegiate women at Howard University in Washington, D.C. Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. is a public service organization that is committed to the uplift of its members as well as the global community. Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. operates on a Five Point Programmatic Thrust that the members use to better serve the community. The points in the Five Point Programmatic Thrust are: Economic Development, Educational Development, International Awareness and Involvement, Physical and Mental Health, and Political Awareness and Involvement. Omicron Gamma became the first predominantly black Greek-lettered organization on UAHuntsville and has been actively serving the campus community for over 32 years.

Zeta Phi Beta Sorority was founded on the simple belief that sorority elitism and socializing should not overshadow the real mission for progressive organizations – to address societal mores, ills, prejudices, poverty, and health concerns of the day. Founded January 16, 1920, Zeta began as an idea conceived by five coeds at Howard University in Washington D.C.: Arizona Cleaver, Myrtle Tyler, Viola Tyler, Fannie Pettie and Pearl Neal. These five women, also known as our Five Pearls, dared to depart from the traditional coalitions for black women and sought to establish a new organization predicated on the precepts of Scholarship, Service, Sisterly Love and Finer Womanhood. It was the ideal of the Founders that the Sorority would reach college women in all parts of the country who were sorority minded and desired to follow the founding principles of the organization. Founder Viola Tyler was often quoted to say “[In the ideal situation] there is Zeta in a girl regardless of race, creed, or color, who has high standards and principles, a good scholarly average and an active interest in all things that she undertakes to accomplish.”

Greek organizations offer incoming members a large network of individuals focused on bettering themselves through service to the university and community. Typically, fraternity and sorority students excel more academically and socially, as well as become involved in more campus organizations than non-member students.



How can Fraternity & Sorority Life assist me scholastically?

Many of the fraternities and sororities at UAHuntsville organize weekly study groups, support and challenge each other to reach higher academic goals, and provide helpful insight on particular classes and professors.

Does your organization haze?

*Under UAHuntsville policy, hazing is a violation of the Code of Student Conduct (Article III. C. 24). **Hazing.** Participation in any form of hazing. Hazing shall be defined as any action taken, requirement or coercive expectation imposed, or situation created by a student organization, its members or persons associated with it, with respect to prospective, trial, or new members of pledges that is, as to the latter, onerous, hazardous, insulting, humiliating, or abusive; that could reasonably be expected to produce mental or physical discomfort, embarrassment, pain, or injury; or that violates any law or University regulation." All national sororities and fraternities have regulations strictly prohibiting hazing. Alabama is one of 31 states with anti-hazing legislation. In the State of Alabama, individuals committing acts of hazing can be charged with a Class C misdemeanor and can be subject to both criminal and civil prosecution. Additionally, an individual or organization participating in hazing or knowingly permitting hazing forfeits entitlement to public funds, scholarships, awards, and grants.
