Minutes, May 7, 2014 Spring General Meeting

Following lunch and a social time the meeting was called to order by Board President, Mary Beth Walker.

Mary Beth announced, for those who might not know, that Dr. Ken Harwell recently died. Several members attended his funeral in Tullahoma. The home address is in the UAHRA Directory if anyone wants to send a card to Sharon.

Our speaker was Mary Scott Hunter, District 8 Representative to the State Board of Education. Ms. Hunter spoke of several challenges to Alabama's education system.

First, high school graduation rates have been low for several years and as a lack of a high school degree, translates to low paying jobs. This is a problem for the individual and the State. In the past few years this rate has risen to approximately 80% for 4-year graduates and closer to 90% for students taking 5 years to graduate.

Secondly, a problem is that although the graduation rates are rising, the number of students entering an institution requiring remedial classes in math or English remain high. This extends the time required to graduate from an institution of higher learning and adds to the students' tuition cost.

Third, Alabama elected not to go with standard testing but has focused on early mastery of targeted courses (e.g. starting in 2nd and 3rd grade) and periodic testing toward identifying student weaknesses (and attempting to correct same) relative to taking the ACT test in the 11th grade.

Fourth, affordability of tuition is a growing problem, both nationally and in the state. It was pointed out that community colleges in the state have a much lower tuition rate than the 4-year universities.

Lastly, Ms. Hunter pointed out that most people who have questioned her about the States's Core Curriculum and other aspects of educational policy admit that they have not read the program descriptions. Those who wish to do so can find them at www.ALSDE.edu.

The three departing Board members, Jim Simpson, Gladys Jones, and Sam Campbell were thanked for their service on the Board.

Mary Beth welcomed two new members: Roxanna Pressnell and Linda Marion.

The minutes of the February 2014 General Meeting, which were distributed in the April newsletter were approved without change or addition.

Board Treasurer, Donna Reed, announced that our four ALCU accounts total \$6,000 and as of today we have 128 members. Although she has been unable to obtain an exact current balance of our endowed scholarship, she did report that a \$1,400 award for academic year 2014-15 will be made.

It was proposed and accepted that, in excess of the "fish bowl funds", the organization will donate from accumulated membership funds, \$1,000/year to the endowed scholarship account.

Mary Beth asked for volunteers for the following positions:

Vice President-President Elect (this is a Board officer position);

Legislative Liaison (this is a committee position);

Newsletter Editor (this is a committee position)
