TH 465 Directing

Professor Amy Guerin

Course Description and Prerequisites:

Theatre forms and styles; director's function and responsibility in producing plays; script analysis; directing laboratory scenes; participation in departmental productions. The prerequisites for this class include completing TH 150, TH 322/323, junior or senior standing, or permission by the instructor.

Learning Outcomes:

In this class students will learn multiple theoretical approaches to directing, via reading/discussion and experiential work, a variety of works in a variety of spaces, both traditional and non-traditional. Students will expand their theoretical and practical theatre knowledge, present effectively, write critically and analyze thoughtfully. Students show mastery of these skills through a combination of moderated discussions, writing assignments and scene presentations.

Course Assignments:

Production Response (100 Points Each/200 Points Total) You will write performance responses on both of the UAH Theatre MainStage production this semester. The responses will be 750-900 words, and turned in via the class Canvas page. Focus on your experience and response to the play in performance, focusing on theme, acting, directing and design elements (lighting, costume, sound, projections.)

Moderated Discussion (150 Points) – During the semester you will moderate one10- 20 minute discussion. You will write 5-7 open-ended discussion questions to turn in.

Discussion Participation (150 Points) -- During the moderated discussions, your participation in the discussion will be noted by number and quality of comments. There are 17 discussions. Aim for approximately 6 quality comments per discussion to receive the maximum number of points.

Director's Notebook (200 points) - At the end of the semester, you will turn in a complete director's notebook,

outlining all of the analytical, conceptual and logistical work done for your final scene presentation. Your points will come from the level of complexity and creativity presented in your notebook.

Final Scene (300 Points) – At the end of the semester, you will direct one 10 minute scene featuring between 2 and 3 actors. The scene must come from a published play written after 2000 that you have not worked on before in any capacity.

Policies:

Class Materials: Please come to every class dressed appropriately for the day, with your copies of the text reading that is due that day and the proper note-taking materials. Phones are not allowed as a note-taking device.

If the door to the classroom is closed, assume that you are docked an unexcused absence. Two unexcused absences equals a full drop in your letter grade in the class.
