Proposed Program: Latin American Studies Minor

What is Latin American Studies?

Latin American Studies is an interdisciplinary program that includes Spanish language study as well as coursework examining the history, culture, politics, and literature of Latin Americans and U.S. Hispanics.

Background

Currently, the avenue for UAH students interested in a deeper study of Latin America is to pursue a Global Studies minor with an area studies concentration in Latin America, which includes 24 credit hours (6 credit hours of Spanish language, 6 credit hours of Global Studies courses, and 12 credit hours of courses related to Latin America, which are selected on an ad hoc basis). While this format provides flexibility, a well-defined Latin American Studies minor program would offer a clear blueprint for students to follow as well as a stronger focus on Latin America.

The proposed Latin American Studies minor would contain two tracks: 1) the basic track, for students not completing a B.A. in Spanish, and 2) the advanced track, for students simultaneously working on a B.A. in Spanish. The basic track includes 24 credit hours: 12 hours of Spanish language (introductory and intermediate levels), 6 credit hours of Latin American history, and 6 credit hours to be selected from various disciplines relevant to Latin America (English, Earth System Science, history, political science, and sociology) or 6 credit hours of advanced Spanish language, and study abroad. Spanish majors wishing to add a Latin American Studies minor to their program of study (which automatically includes Spanish language) would be required to take 6 credit hours of Latin American history and 15 credit hours from various disciplines relevant to Latin America or pursue study abroad in a Spanish-speaking country for a total of 21 credit hours.

This model has the potential to increase introductory and intermediate-level Spanish language course enrollments, attract Hispanic students who may not wish to pursue upper-level Spanish study but who do want to deepen their knowledge of their Hispanic heritage, and promote study abroad. This program should also enhance UAH's recruitment of Hispanic students as its presence in the curriculum will provide not only an opportunity for academic coursework, but also serve as an emblem of welcome to a campus that embraces diversity.

Most of the courses included in the following course listing require no explanation, but a few may call for clarification. ARH 103 (Non-Western Traditions) includes the study of art in the Americas. EH 439 (Ethnic American Novel) includes literature by U. S. Latino/Latina writers. ESS 210 (Collapse of Civilizations) and ESS 307 (Environmental Archeology) cover ancient indigenous civilizations of the Americas, such as the Mayas and Incas. SOC 415 (Sociology of Globalization) includes case studies of developing countries in Latin America, among other regions. The proposed Latin American Studies minor will follow the longstanding model of the UAH Women's and Gender Studies minor in determining appropriate program content.
