OLLI Celebrates 15th Anniversary

Dr. Jean Foster Herron joined us on September 19, to celebrate our 15th Anniversary and to honor those original members who volunteered their time and ideas into what we know now is our wonderful OLLI.

It all began in 1993, when Dr. Herron, under the directorship of Dr. Mike Oliver, Director of UAH Continuing Education, carefully outlined a program at UAH dedicated to lifelong learning for retired seniors. Over 150 seniors responded to an ad she placed in the newspaper. They attended that first meeting at Spraggins Hall, and, with determination and purpose, launched the successful Academy for Lifetime Learning (ALL).

The first meeting on August 3, 1993 resulted in the forming of a Steering Committee which soon created a Curriculum Committee. Eight courses were offered for the Fall 93 term and 22 courses for the Winter 94 term. Each year, under the management of Dr. Herron, the Academy grew in membership as well as the number of courses offered.

Today, the original membership of 150 has grown to over 1,000 members and more than 55 courses. Thanks to the direction of Dr. Jean Herron and the perseverance of the original members who built a solid foundation for what was the Academy of Lifetime Learning (ALL) and is now Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI). We are eternally grateful for the legacy of their labor.






Greetings from Special Events

Curriculum Corner Welcome back to classes! I hope you are enjoying your courses as much as I am mine. I know you are not enjoying the parking, but please

continue to be patient. Relief is in sight. Keep in mind it's a good indication that the University is undergoing a growth phase.

I want to take this opportunity to remind all of you how important it is to drop classes that you do not plan to attend. Over a third of our courses have waiting lists and some of them have as many as eight people on the list. All you have to do is call the business office at 824-6010 to let someone know you won't be attending any more classes. If there are courses that instructors are willing to re-schedule to give folks a second chance to register, we will do our best to schedule them for a future term.

Please also remember that class registration is handled on a first-come, first-served basis. There is NO process in place for giving preference to anyone, regardless of the circumstances. I am aware that a number of you tried to continue courses that you took last spring and were wait-listed, and I know you are disappointed. My recommendation is to register as early as you possibly can each term. Some of you were caught up in software problems that resulted from the on-line registration system upgrade, and a number of accommodations were made by Continuing Education and the Business Office to make things right if you were one of those people.

As we turn our attention to the winter term, please remember that syllabi are due Oct. 24. The winter term is Jan. 12 - Mar. 9, 2009. Start thinking of courses you would like to have in the spring term and forward those to the subcommittee chairs listed on the back of your course catalogs. We are still looking for instructors. Call the office at 824-6959. If no one answers, leave a message. Someone will pick it up and forward it to the correct people.
