about changes in the registration process. If you are having problems with registration, stop by our new office in Wilson Hall. We will have folks available to help you starting January 4.



The Curriculum Corner.

Our winter 2010 course term is just a few weeks away, with **registration beginning on Wednesday, January 6.** While the registration process is similar to last term, there are few subtle changes resulting from both a physical move and a name change. OLLI will be back in a remodeled Wilson Hall, laid out entirely differently from when we left. And our affiliate Continuing Education (CE), also back in Wilson Hall, is now Professional and Continuing Studies (PCS).

You will have the same four ways to register as described in the inside front cover of your catalog:



- ◆ Mail registration will be addressed to a new name PCS and a new address.
- To register in Person you will deliver your completed registration to the PCS Registration office in Room 103 Wilson Hall or to the OLLI Office in 151 Wilson Hall. There will be no drop-off box.
- The **online registration** will be similar to last term, but note that the CE name-change to PCS has resulted in a new online registration cite name.

The new OLLI office, Wilson Hall 151, will be staffed beginning January 4. Our office volunteers will be available to assist you with questions on winter term courses or in filling out your registration form. To get to the OLLI office, veer to the left when you enter the main entrance of Wilson Hall. To get to the PCS Registration Office, veer right.

We expect the winter term to be an adjustment period with a whole new environment for OLLI and PCS, so please be patient. However, if you experience some real difficulties (not just minor inconveniences) or have some suggestions on improvements and enhancements, please don't hesitate to email or call me.

Conduct of Competition

There are Competitors.

- <u>EACH</u> competitor is responsible for contacting their assigned opponent, agreeing on a date, time, and location for playing their game.
- -When the two competitors meet, each should have a deck of playing cards, and the document Rules for OLLI SURVIVOR Competition. If there should be only one copy of this material, or only one deck of cards and that deck of cards has less than 52 cards, that is OK, too.
 - A game duration will be mutually agreed to and the game will be played.
- The winning competitor will email both the *Competition Master* (at <u>ollisurvivor@yahoo.com</u>) and your game opponent the results of the game. To maintain the competition schedule, either failure to report the game results by the calendar deadline, for whatever reason, will result in both competitors being eliminated.
- Perform above competitor steps until either eliminated or until one player is declared overall winner. Final match winner is the OLLI SURVIVOR and will be awarded recognition of this accomplishment.

The Special Events Committee of OLLI, in cooperation with Lake Guntersville Resort State Park, invites you to participate in **Eagle Awareness Weekend**, **January 22 - 24**, **2010**, to observe and study this magnificent national symbol, the bald eagle. Eagle Awareness has been a tradition at Lake Guntersville State Park for more than twenty years, and is an activity that people of all ages can enjoy. The Park Naturalist and a host of field trip guides and

guest speakers make these weekends an event you won't soon forget. All programs (guided nature hikes to Eagle nesting sites, lectures, live birds, excellent scenery and much more) are free of charge.

Package rates are available which include the Friday night apple cider and coffee social (don't miss it!), Friday and Saturday night lodging, two breakfast buffets, and lunch and dinner on Saturday. Basic Eagle packages start at \$219.14 for one person per room or \$282.00 for 2 people per room (does not include tax). Packages don't include the popular Friday night Seafood Buffet (\$14.95), but it's worth the extra price! Other packages are available for lakeside cottages or mountaintop chalets, and are on the Park website at http://www.alapark.com/lakeguntersville/Specials%20&%20 Packages:/. You may also create your own weekend at regular rates for rooms and meals (see below).



Arrival time is 4:00 p.m. (rooms may be available earlier). Checkout is 11:00 a.m. (In case you want to play an early round of golf on the park's championship course).

OLLI has reserved a block of rooms for our group: 10 hotel rooms on the bluff (sleeps 2), 5 rooms facing the parking lot on the ground floor (sleeps 2), and 2 king-size suites (sleeps 4).

Reese Kilgo Wins First Place in Constest for "The Shadow of the Hawk"

Reese Danley-Kilgo styles herself a Reader/Writer/Gardner in her Amazon.com profile, but her activities easily exceed these boundaries. She is also an activist in the most positive sense of the word, using her energy, voice, and intellect to speak for the underserved, dismissed, or forgotten throughout the world. Since her retirement from the University of Alabama, Huntsville, Reese is an active OLLI member and perhaps a model for ways retirees might use their newly refocused time. She has authored the novel Nine Bean Rows (2007), has taught various literature classes, worked with and spoken at public library programs, and written award-winning poetry and short fiction. Her poem "Tinker Toys," won the Senior Poet Laureate Award for the state of Alabama; in 2003 her poem "Late November" won first prize in the Green River Writers Writing Contest, and two poems won honorable mention. And most recently, her story "The Shadow of the Hawk" won first place in the short fiction category of the Green River Writers Writing Contest for 2009.

Each term the individual subcommittees arrange for courses in their discipline which results in approximately 50-60 courses. The goal is to present interesting and innovative courses in order to have as many attendees as possible. They check the course syllabi, recruit a facilitator, and monitor the course as the term progresses.

There are three task forces and their activities are divided as follows:

Task Force I works with the subcommittee chairs to be sure all syllabi are complete and are turned in by the deadline. It assigns the days and times the courses will be taught, reviews course equipment needs, and edits the Curriculum Catalog each term as it is prepared for typing and printing. It sends a welcoming letter, which includes an instructor information sheet, to all instructors two to three weeks before the term begins. Chaired by Sue Chatham, Task Force I is responsible for pre-term activities, particularly the catalog preparation.

Task Force II works with the subcommittee chairs to recruit and train the facilitators. It monitors equipment usage, room changes, etc. and, in general, works to have the term proceed as smoothly as possible. Dave Knepper, Chair, is responsible for activities during the term, particularly those concerning equipment and facilitators.

Task Force III prepares invitations to all instructors for the Teacher Appreciation social and compiles and distributes the course evaluations made by class members at the completion of each term. Chaired by Al Spratley, Task Force III is responsible for post-term activities, particularly the compilation of course evaluations and teacher appreciation activities.
