We have an exciting group! These comments from members of the OLLI Hiking Member Interest Group (MIG) exhibit their enthusiasm!

"When we moved here from Colorado we prayed that there would be a group that we could hike with and we have not been disappointed."

"This is a great way to learn about different hiking areas in the Huntsville area—areas that ordinarily we would not know about."

"This is a wonderful way to meet new people." One couple even met each other on a hike while having a photo made in a hollowed out tree!

The OLLI hiking MIG will be two years old in the fall of 2015 and now has over 150 members. We have hikes on Thursdays (easier ones) and Fridays (more difficult), generally following the OLLI calen-

dar; however, we will normally start one week earlier and finish one week later. There may be *ad hoc* hikes offered from time to time which do not follow the Thursday/Friday schedule.

Once you join this OLLI member interest group, you have not only the detailed hiking schedules, but access to information about other hiking opportunities in the region — other organizations and clubs which are



available. In addition, you will receive background historical information on several of our hikes as well as the latest edition of *Hiking in the Huntsville Area* which outlines the entire hiking program in the region with various links.



We have multiple hike leaders giving us the flexibility to divide our hikes into a fast/slow, beginner/advanced, or any other configuration to make the hike member-friendly. Our hike leaders conduct exploratory hikes in order to find new routes or to determine the timing and level of difficulty before being adopted by our group.

Hikes are normally from 9 am to 12 pm, but a few start at 8:30 am due to length. This enables OLLI members to attend classes after the hikes. We hike a variety of Land Trust properties, Monte Sano State Park, and County and City trails.

Please Do

- Include appropriate black and white pictures, graphs, poems, illustrations, etc.
- Use Times New Roman font size 12
- Use Bold for the title and one blank line before your name (centered on page)
- Insert two blank lines after your name
- Use 1.5 line spacing between written lines and paragraphs
- Indent first line of each paragraph one half inch
- Align right and left with 1 inch margins
- Top margin should be 1 inch and bottom margin should be 1.25 inch
- Rank order of submittals—most preferred first
- Print only on single side
- Save in Microsoft Word

If you have more than one story, to maximize the space available to you, skip three lines and begin your new story (titled as above) after the preceding story rather than beginning on a new page.

Please Do Not Use

- More than ten pages
- Page numbers
- Justification of right margins
- Hyphenation at right margins



OLLI Member Spotlight



And the Award Goes to . . .

Linda Singleton McAllister, choral director and volunteer in our community for decades, received the 2015 Virginia Hammill Simms Award at the annual arts awards banquet hosted by the Community Ballet Association on April 10. Linda has been an active member of OLLI for ten years, serving on our Board of Directors, the Curriculum Committee, and the Public Relations Com-

mittee, as an instructor/coordinator for many classes, and wherever she has seen a need. Linda is also a recent inductee into the Huntsville City Schools Choral Directors Association Hall of Fame. As a dedicated proponent of the arts and arts education, Linda is a representative to the Arts Council and a member of both the Huntsville Museum of Art and the Huntsville Botanical Garden. She is a volunteer with Monte Sano Women's Club, and has directed children's, youth and adult choirs at First Presbyterian Church. The award recognized Linda's founding and supporting role in the Huntsville Master Chorale as well as her work for arts education in Alabama and the Southeast. She was a statewide music coordinator in Tennessee, and has been a presenter, adjudicator, and festival conductor in a number of venues. Before retiring, Linda was the music teacher and Choral Director at the Huntsville City Schools Academy for Academics and Arts, a K-8 arts magnet school.

Your editor had an opportunity to speak with Linda about her recent award and her involvement in the Huntsville community.

Editor: You are a founder and charter member of the Huntsville Master Chorale. Why did you think a master chorale was important to our community?

Linda: There was no venue to sing wonderful literature in a small auditioned chamber choir. The Huntsville Master Chorale provided talented singers the opportunity to share choral music with an audience who would appreciate that music.

Editor: Was it difficult to start up? How long did it take to get it going?

Linda: Right from the beginning, we had the singers. We began as the Eugene Brasher Chorale, a name we kept from 1998 until 2006 when Dr. Brasher retired. At that time, we organized as the Huntsville Master Chorale. Of course, we had no money, no reliable funding at all. We borrowed all our music and survived on donations from Chorale members. When we organized as a non-profit we were able to broaden our base for tax deductible donations and sponsors. Dr. Patricia Ramirez Hacker, our director for the past three years, originated the "Mosaic of Love" our Valentine's Day Fundraiser. That's now an annual event and has been well-received in the community. Last year, we added a second performance in order to accommodate the expanded audience. I am especially pleased that OLLI members have been so supportive of this and other Chorale concerts.

Editor: Can you tell me about Virginia Hammill Simms? And why this award is meaningful?

Linda: Mrs. Simms was the wife *Huntsville Times* editor, Leroy Simms, and an arts enthusiast. She was even instrumental in presenting an idea for ten acres in downtown Huntsville to then-First Lady Lady Bird Johnson. Big Springs International Park attracted Mrs. Johnson's attention in her principal project "America the Beautiful." Her involvement in the park's creation led to many international donations to the park, including the Japanese bridge that spans a section over the Big Springs. After Mrs. Simms' death, the Community Ballet Association memorialized her appreciation for the arts with an award to a deserving volunteer in the Arts in Huntsville starting in 1967. The prestigious award is given annually. This award brings recognition to local arts organizations, gives them publicity and offers them opportunities to interact with other like-minded people in a well-attended event. It reminds us all how important the arts have been and are here in Huntsville. It distinguishes us as a small city with a diversity of interests. And, much to my surprise, the Virginia Hammill Simms Award included a monetary donation to the Huntsville Master Chorale.


Memphis in April



Memphis in Springtime — Couldn't Have Been Better

And we couldn't have had better weather when fifteen OLLI members caravanned the first week of April west through Decatur. Red fields of rich loam are called "Decatur Red," and these were laid out flat as a pancake in varying states of tilled, planted, and blooming. The artists among us exclaimed about the colors changing in the fields from dark chestnut red to bright emerald to mustard yellow as we traveled. One or another of us would comment about what we were seeing — "that's rape seed, first saw it in France;" "you know we call it canola

now;" "winter wheat;" "crop rotation, cotton takes a lot out of the ground." So the trip began with talking with new acquaintances and fairly soon blended into the horizon of a broad dark river; and that led into an enchanting avenue curving through a restored waterfront holding grand new bluff houses and imaginations. We eased right into downtown Memphis, Beale Street, Peabody Place, Second Avenue, and pulled into the little hidden courtyard of our hotel.

Our trip couldn't have been better orchestrated by Nancy Darnall. We saw the best venues possible for the time we had. Memphis offers a pallet of dining options and we sampled the spectrum, first stop BB King's for luncy favorh. Mite was Paulette's on Mud Island with a scenic view of the Mississippi River front. The Majestic Grille, site of the former Majestic Theatre, features fine dining with continuous viewings of old black-and-white movies. Well-versed travelers were surprised at the rich treasures of the Memphis museums. We reveled in the gardens and rooms of the Dixon Gallery and Gardens featuring a special exhibit of works from the British Museum and 150,000 exotic tulips. The Brooks Museum of Art and the Brushmark Restaurant were splendid for current exhibits, luncheon, and the Overton Park setting.

But the *pièce de resistance* was the Belz Museum of Asian and Judaic Art at Peabody Place — too many treasures to describe, but let us entice you with the information that only about ten percent of the Belz collection is on display here; Debbie West informed us that the exhibits in Memphis surpassed the art she saw in China when she studied there on a Fulbright Grant. Ivory, jade, bronze, porcelain, and mammoth tusks were among the media used for the art. Much of this museum's displays are from late dynasties and show exquisite workmanship developed as finer tools were designed.



Beale Street did not disappoint with hot soul food, cool blues, and drumming into the night (a few souls were happy to have brought along ear plugs). The Rock and Soul Museum and Gibson Guitar Factory tell the story of Memphis music that fueled the rebirth of downtown in the 1960s. A short stop at the Lorraine Motel reminded us of the grim events of the American Civil Rights Movement. Several members took their free time to explore the Cotton Museum, seeing a timeline, watching a documentary history, and listening to oral histories of sharecroppers, Cotton Exchange employees, and farmers.

Backbeat Tours of Memphis handled our restaurant and museum reservations as well as our city tour, ghost tour, and Gibson Guitar Factory arrangements. Every venue was expecting us, greeting us and making our Memphis experience outstanding. All told, OLLI Memphis trip couldn't have been better!
