A Note From the Director

I read **Suburbia** earlier this year on the advice of a old friend who had produced the play at his remarkable theatre in central Illinois. It was shocking and engaging and I was completely terrified. Brutal and honest and brave, I knew we had to do it here at UAH.

I offered it to my students who were equally intrigued because they had something they wanted to say and this play said it all. They chose to present it as written; word for word. They threw themselves into the dark and troubling circumstances and worked tirelessly to create this world they knew so well. One that is confusing and dangerous - even in the suburbs.

Why? Culture has traditionally been passed down through family, church and school. Decades later we face a culture that is passed down from the internet, fast food restaurants, the mall and our peers. This play shows the results. A generation that is super intelligent, angry, morally confused and totally lacking any prescription for living. Lost. Yet each carries the keys to this, our amazing world. Each has untold power to shape the future and unlock their staggering potential.

At the turn of the last century, Theatre entered a period of realism that sought to hold a mirror up to society in order to bring about change. And here we are, a century later, holding up a mirror up to society to bring about change. Using this powerful medium to communicate.
