At BMSS, Murry works as an intern in their government contracting accounting group. "BMSS has a strong passion for service, and that is a value I want to include in my lifestyle," Murry said about working for BMSS.

Thanks to her FYE class in the College of Business (COB), she has learned so much about accounting. "I believe that UAH and the COB are supporting me with all of my stops and detours with their numerous resources," Murry said.

radley Robison, 33, dropped out of college at 18 years old before joining the Marine Corps. In 2014, Robison exited the Marine Corps to start a dream and return to college.

Robison returned to college as a non-traditional student at Pitt Community College in North Carolina before later transferring to The University of Alabama in Huntsville (UAH). Robison was a student mentor to those first entering college. He helped incoming freshmen and other veterans on campus.

"He is a selfless leader who raises up those around him and is always honest with others," said Justin Mayo, a friend of Robison. Robison's leadership also extended to his own business ventures.

While at Pitt Community College,

Robison helped open Uptown Brewing Company and joined their production team.

After moving back to Huntsville, Robison joined the Rocket Republic Brewing team before becoming the head brewer at Below the Radar. Robison then attended Siebel Brewing Academy to become a brewmaster and went out on his own in the brewing industry.

In 2017, Robison decided to pursue his dream of opening a brewery and decided to start Fractal Brewing Project. He found investors and worked to get his plan and pitch right. "Fractal Brewing Project in Huntsville started breaking ground in 2018," said Robison.

In 2021, Robison was invited to teach two brewing courses at Calhoun Community College (CCC). At CCC, he led students with his own coursework, instructing students to be leaders in the brewery industry.

Unfortunately, in August 2023, Robison had to close the brewery because of the COVID-19 aftermath. "I experienced developing a business and brand, trying to grow and navigate logistical issues and pricing of raw materials, and attempting to pivot a large business model post-COVID to be successful."

Currently, Robison works at Yulista Integrated Solutions. He also serves on a board that raises money for backpacks and supplies for local schools and for remote Alaskan Native villages. He is also

working at Jasper Yeast Labs in Washington, D.C., and is a parttime account executive for Rocket 95.1, The Beat 98.1, and Star 99.1. "I've learned that we are capable of more than we realize, just by



performing leaps of faith, not underestimating ourselves," Robison said about his successes.

Robison dedicates his free time to supporting local nonprofit veteran organizations. "Bradley is an outstanding example of a community leader. Since I have known him, he has been a part of or led several projects that have made a positive impact within the veteran community," said Carlo Esclamando, a friend of Robison's.

As a Business Student Ambassador, Mazow is a leader who dedicates time to serving others while representing the university. According to the UAH website, the overall goal of the program is for these student leaders to share the UAH COB experience with prospective students, alumni, and community members.

"I talked with everyone back home, but then suddenly my social life dropped off because I spoke zero English and had a pretty bad speech impediment."

> But this didn't slow Navarro down at all when he began classes at middle school. "I just learned English on the fly, making new friends, talking between classes, listening to music and watching TV."

Navarro's impediment came from his cleft palate, requiring numerous surgeries throughout his life which he just shrugs off. "I don't see it as an impediment; I see it as one more obstacle to overcome."

Navarro's overcoming spirit led him all the way to The University of Alabama in Huntsville (UAH)

and the College of Business (COB), where he has been serving as an Ambassador.

"Being a COB Ambassador changed my life; it has made me into truly a social butterfly," he said. "I have made a lot of great connections with the staff and made invaluable friendships because of it."

Navarro is also a member of the Sigma Nu Fraternity. He says this experience "has made me realize what real friendship is, and how a group of what might seem like random guys can turn into a family." Doing community service and raising money for charity has "really expanded my college experience," Navarro said. "I love all my brothers and LTH (love, truth, honor)."

One of the many obstacles Navarro has overcome is joining the Army Reserve Officer Training Corps, which required another surgery on his cleft palate in August of 2022. Navarro was so used to these procedures that he was up and around after only one month of recovery. "I want to be an Army aviator," Navarro says, "and 'be all you can be' as the Army slogan says."

Navarro's duties related to the Alabama National Guard split his time between classes in Huntsville and his unit in Birmingham. If that wasn't enough in his schedule, he also takes care of his grandparents. His grandfather was Navarro's inspiration to join the Army. Most recently he helped them complete their taxes. When asked if his economics

studies helped doing so, Navarro said, "no, this is the easy stuff. I'm academically motivated in economics, to see how money makes the world go 'round."

Nichols, a senior studying management at The University of Alabama in Huntsville (UAH) College of Business, is a star basketball player for the UAH women's basketball team. Her journey began at eight years old when she started playing competitive basketball. From there she never stopped-earning numerous awards in high school for her athletic performance. Nichols was an eight-time varsity letter winner, placed second in the nation at the junior Olympic games, and placed in the top five at the state meet back-to-back.

Prior to joining UAH, she was enrolled as a student-athlete at The University of Tennessee at Martin (UT Martin) where she was faced with many life challenges. She experienced a challenging inquiry, requiring surgery and hours of physical therapy. She also experienced the peak of the COVID-19 pandemic, the loss of a beloved family member, and a tornado that devastated the Martin community. However, even through each challenge, Nichols found ways to bounce back.

After the tornado hit, Nichols didn't waste any time. The tragedy in the community moved her to volunteer for many weeks cleaning up the city and helping those affected by the tragedy. She said, "Being able to help those in need mentally and physically was heartwarming for me. Seeing people lose everything due to the tornado was very sad. I enjoyed being able to help prepare meals and help clean up the town."

Nichols makes it very clear that basketball is truly her passion, but volunteer work is also incredibly important to her. She currently helps prepare meals for those in need through SERVE, a volunteer organization that helps provide hope for those in need. She also volunteers at Sleep in Heavenly Peace, an organization that provides bunk beds to children and families in need. Additionally, she volunteered at the Salvation Army for over five years, while also assisting with various children's camps. "I have always tried my best to be an example of patience, determination, and excellence," she said.

Another characteristic that makes Nichols stand out is her entrepreneurial spirit. While she was in high school, she launched a lawn care business in her community. Now looking back,



she said, "Starting a lawn care and landscaping business taught me responsibility, respect, and hard work. Being able to provide a service that helps others was great to have. Having this business gave me the chance to meet and talk with others in the community frequently which was an amazing opportunity." She was even able to buy her own car.

olli Grissom grew up in an underprivileged environment, where most of her immediate family did not finish high school. As she entered college and began to grow a family of her own, she was worried that the cycle of poverty would continue with her. Despite the obstacles that have come her way, Grissom has managed to assert herself on the path to success.

Grissom says she always knew she didn't want to continue living the life of poverty she was born into. "I had lofty dreams to become a rocket scientist, thinking that it would bring me the money, respect and prestige my family was never able to get," Grissom says.

Her journey to becoming the student she is now started in 2010 when she graduated as salutatorian from high school. She then entered The University of Alabama in Huntsville (UAH) as an aerospace

engineer.

After sitting in a computer-aided design (CAD) lab at UAH for two semesters, she realized she was burning out. "Engineering was not in the cards for me, so I left the CAD lab to drop my class and change majors," Grissom says. "I had experienced my first failure, and it was devastating."

One semester after changing her major to finance, she found out she was pregnant with her first daughter.

At the time, Grissom was 19 years old and faced many overwhelming decisions. She thought, how could one person balance the pressure of being a new student and parent all at once? Grissom soon proved her ability to do just that.

She paused her academic pursuit and continued working as a veterinary assistant while her future husband finished his chemical engineering degree.

As time progressed, Grissom felt a new kind of pressure to find the "right time" to finish her degree in finance. Her husband then graduated in 2015, and even more major life decisions came their way — among them were choosing jobs, buying a house and deciding to have their second daughter.

In 2020, Grissom decided to become a gestational surrogate. "I wanted to use something that had caused me such adversity to bless someone else."

When their youngest daughter entered kindergarten, Grissom

returned to UAH to finish her Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) in finance. Although she initially felt shame for not finishing her degree "when she was supposed to," she wears her past



with a badge of honor, knowing she worked hard and learned valuable life lessons.

Grissom has found a great support system at UAH, noting that Mona Foroughi, the College of Business (COB) career and internship supervisor, has helped provide career tips and opportunities.

"The teachers are great and always supportive," Grissom says. "They care about their students' learning of the material. I felt like I have been able to bond with them, especially as I get further into degree-specific classes."

Grissom will start her first job in finance this summer as a financial planning intern with Twickenham Advisors, a financial consultant located in downtown Huntsville.

As she began to choose her ideal

career path, Shackelford found her interests lay in marketing. "Planning events is so fun for me and to see an empty space become a beautiful place with people laughing and making memories is something I will never get tired of being a part of," she says.

In 2021, Shackelford attended Shelton State Community College (SSCC) in Tuscaloosa, where she received an award for "Excellence in Economics" and graduated with an associate degree in business, management, marketing and related supported services.

Shackelford transferred to The University of Alabama in Huntsville (UAH) in 2023. In a relatively short time, she has embraced several roles in leadership. She is currently the vice president of events and programming for Kappa Delta, a Student Government Association (SGA) senator and the marketing chair for Alpha Kappa Psi.

Shackelford is also a member of the Women in Business and Leadership (WBL) club at UAH, which provides students with numerous networking, skill development and personal growth opportunities with a mission to promote inclusivity in the business world.

lobal lockdown could not slow down Jennifer Kramer. When circumstances prevented her family from living overseas, she made new opportunities for herself, honing her mind and body as a Charger at The University of Alabama Huntsville (UAH).

Jennifer began her collegiate journey at Calhoun Community College, before transferring to UAH in January 2023, with an unexpected speed bump early on. "As a management major, I had to take Business Transitions. One of our first assignments was to submit our resume," Jennifer said, "and I came close to dropping the class over it!" With their family on deployment around the world, all of Jennifer's job experiences were as a volunteer, and all were with references in other countries. As a stay-at-home wife and mother, Jennifer said she "had no idea how my skills translated into anything useful or valuable in the business world." Then, after just one semester, Jennifer "not only managed to build a resume, but was grateful to accept a position working as a UAH College of Business Ambassador."

But a lifelong dream of school wasn't the only silver lining Jennifer found. "I used that time of [COVID] solitude to tackle anything in my life I could control. I started with my fitness level."

Jennifer had been a power skating coach, but "after a decade-plus of overseas living, indulging in wonderful German food and beer, I did not look like one!" She made a promise to herself, a new



pair of skates, if she could get back to her competition weight by her 50th birthday. "I succeeded and still maintain a healthy body."

Looking forward, Jennifer says, "family will always come first." In addition to her husband and child, she helps care for her four grandchildren and her father. "Life may still hold many more challenge, but one thing I know for certain is that I love UAH. Go Chargers!"
