I came to DIA right after earning a B.A. in Intelligence Studies. I joined DIA because of its mission and position supporting our military as well as all of the opportunities to serve and grow in my skillset.

As an entry-level intelligence officer, I contributed to analysis that reached some of our highest customers, including the Secretary and Deputy Secretary of Defense, U.S. combatant commanders and the Presidential Daily Brief.

Separately, I have taken rotations where I acted in a leadership position with an ODNI-sponsored task force and worked as a watch officer during a period of global unrest. While deployed to Afghanistan, I served as the team lead over a group of Army and Air Force intelligence officers, and I've even done a rotation with the Office of Corporate Communications as a strategic communications officer.

I started working at DIA in 2008 as an undergraduate student intern. During the semester, I worked part time at the DIA element located at the former Joint Forces Command in Norfolk, Virginia. I come from a long line of civil servants and military veterans, which instilled a sense of service and patriotism in me that led me to commission as a military intelligence officer in the Army Reserves and concurrently joined DIA as a contractor.

As a civilian at DIA, I was able to take advantage of opportunities overseas and at home, gathering experiences that benefited my civilian and military careers. I also used DIA's support of professional development to take agency-funded courses relevant to my job to earn my master's in international relations.

I came to DIA in 2013 as a reservist assigned to DIA's National Media Exploitation Center (NMEC). I started off drilling on the weekends at NMEC, learning its mission. In 2015 I was offered an opportunity to come in on active orders to lead the Operations and Integrations (O&I) team at NMEC and serve as the liaison officer to Joint Special Operations Command and U.S. Special Operations Command. In this position, I work and meet with foreign partners, combatant commands and different elements of the National Mission Force. As the O&I team lead, I work with the combatant commands to assist them in developing their document and media exploitation program. I have acquired more operational and analytical skills, allowing me to mature as an officer and further understand how different types of intelligence can come together to tell a story.
